## Administration of Nursing Gare

Perhaps you have seen some new nurses around Moffitt Hos-pital-and there will be more as graduate nurses from hospitals and health agencies feel the need for further education and return to school.
A class in Administration of Nursing Care is now in session. Eighty-six graduate nurses from San Mateo County and vicinity worked with their local League for Nursing in requesting this particular class. The University of California Department of Continuing Education in Nursing designed this course to meet their special needs.
The class meets one evening a week for three-hour sessions for an eleven-week period. For two days during this period, the students come to the Medical Center for supervised patient care. This is an important aspect of the continuing education program for registered nurses. It is not only necessary for the nurse to add to her theoretical knowledge, but also improve her skill and enrich her concepts of direct patient care. Many of these nurses hold high level positions of supervision or head nursing, and have not given direct patient care for many years. It is hoped that by returning to the bedsill be better one day, the nurse windients and their needs. Following this experience, each nurse was assigned to her. counterpart in Moffitt Hospital for one day, i.e. staff nurses were assigned with staff nurses, supervisors with supervisors, etc. In this experience exchange of ideas and new ways of
