PARKING AVAILABLE IN MILLBERRY UNION

NOTE: At present Decal parking is not available due to quota fulfillment.

Parking is available in the Student Union to students, employees, non-faculty research personnel and the general public under various arrangements established through the San Francisco Campus Parking Program. Combined garage capacity is 825 vehicles. Decal fee for four of the five existing decal parking (entrance on Irving) classifications is \$33.00 per year or \$2.75 per month. Employees may pay by payroll deduction if they so desire. Public parking (entrance on Pamassus Ave) rates are \$.25 per hour, \$1.25 for the first day, and a maximum of \$1.00 for each additional day.

The combined structure increment II Garage will be operated only Monday through Friday, for the benefit of decal holders and will be AVAILABLE FROM 7:00 a.m. TO 10:00 p.m. CARS MAY BE LEFT IN THE PARKING AREAS BETWEEN 10:00 p.m. AND 7:00 a.m., AND ON WEEKENDS, BUT THEY WILL NOT BE ACCESSIBLE DURING THESE PERIODS.

In order to increase the revenue which will also contribute to maintaining the decal fee at a reasonable level, daily maximum parking rates will be in effect on days of 49er home games, for the East-West football game and at such other times as a special event may indicate the desirability of this reservation.

Upon student inquiries the Parking Service has considered the possibility of weekend and night access to the parking area. This arrangement was suggested by those who lived in the near vicinity and desired garage parking. High operational costs during these hours have made this plan appear unlikely in the near future. The necessity of a gate guard is one of the major reasons that (See page 11, col. 2)

Statement Regarding Use of the Trampoline

The trampoline, because of its popularity, receives a great deal of use. However, because one can be easily and seriously hurt when not properly instructed on its use, the trampoline is kept under lock and key and is only checked out to those who are properly qualified to supervise its use. Permission to check out a key for the trampoline must be obtained from the Recreation Supervisor. A list of those persons who are qualified to use the apparatus will be kept at the Athletic Control Desk and the key will not be checked out to anyone who has not been cleared by the Recreation Supervisor for its use.

SWIMMING INSTRUCTION

Sign-ups for the fall swimming instruction program have exceeded expectations. Nearly all classes are full; however, sign-ups are still being accepted. Adult classes are held on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Children's classes are held on Saturday mornings. Schedules of all classes may be obtained by calling the Union swimming pool. Ext. 723.

Mr. Rodger Jones is the swimming instructor in charge of all of the aquatic program. He will be assisted in the children's instruction classes by Miss Loretta Barrious and in the senior life-saving by Mr. Tony Montonari.

SKIN DIVING

Special skin diving course will be conducted at the Union pool Wednesday evenings from 8-9 p.m. by Mr. Rodger Jones. All those interested in learning the techniques of skin diving are invited to sign up for this program.

The skin diving course is for advanced swimmers only. The course will cover fundamentals of skin diving with an introduction to scuba diving (self-contained underwater breathing apparatus). Participants will be required to supply their own equipment. The first class session will cover types of equipment needed. Course will start on Wednesday, October 5 and end Wednesday, December 14

Note: A scuba diving course will be offered during the spring semester.

SENIOR LIFE SAVING COURSE

A 20-hour course in senior life saving will be conducted at the Union on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 8-9 p.m., starting Tuesday, October 4 and ending Thursday, December 15. Mr. Tony Montonari will be the senior life saving course instructor. In order to enroll in

the senior life saving course, swimmers must be able to pass the standard Red Cross Advanced Swimmers test. Tests for eligibility will be given during the first meeting of the class.

It should be noted that a Red Cross Water Safety Instructors course is scheduled for the spring semester. Anyone desiring to take the Water Safety Instructors course must have a senior life saving certificate.

BRIDGE PROGRAM

Sign-ups are now being accepted at the Millberry Union Central Desk for the DUPLICATE CONTRACT BRIDGE SECTION which meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month from 7:30–10:30 p.m. and the SOCIAL CONTRACT BRIDGE SECTION which meets on the second Tuesday of each month from 7:30–10:30 p.m. Mr. Glen Carey is the director in charge of the bridge program. Glen conducted a very successful program last year and we are glad to have him back directing the program this year.

SKETCHES BY TROUVERE

Impressions
of a contemporary Wandering Minstrel

Allow me to introduce myself: I am a wandering minstrel — a contemporary wandering minstrel — whose life is passed in journeying and singing somgs of what I see. Unlike most minstrels, I lack a mandolin (or other musical instrument) strapped to my back — I rely on the music of humanity itself to accompany my songs.

I chance to be here through a personal misfortune, or so it seemed at first. While touring this fine city, I suddenly fell ill and, having no CPS-, Bankameri-, or creditcard, but possessing a marvelous array of exotic and mysterious symptoms, I found myself transported to a shiny room here in the hospital.

My arrival was hailed by all and celebrated by an endless procession of white-clad healers, bearing gifts, who manifested their joy at my fascinating state by poking, prodding, sticking, thumping, squeezing and rubbing me, all the while murmuring incantations. I was visited by a silent phalanx of doctors who listened intently, puffing pipes in unison, while their leader described my woes in deep, painful detail. They intoned "hmmmmm" together, puffed a last puff, and, firmly holding their stethescopes, marched out.

This went on for a time — all efforts at curing me going to no avail — until one glorious moming I awoke well. My illness had gone! Of course everyone was surprised and, I suppose, some were disappointed. A controversy developed concerning who it was who had cured me. . . .

And so, while the argument rages, I have taken up residence here at the medical center. My intention is to comment on the passing scene, to discuss what goes on here, to sketch the foibles and frailties of those engaged in the learning and teaching of medical science.

MEDICAL SCIENCE EXPOSITION HELD LAST SPRING

The first annual Medical Sciences Exposisition was held last May 6th, 7th and 8th, at the University of California Medical Center, San Francisco. It consisted of some 70 displays and demonstrations from 28 Medical Center departments, schools and research groups.

The exposition was held in the gymnasium of the Medical Center's Guy S. Millberry Union. The public was invited.

The program was organized by the U. C. student branch of the American Pharmaceutical Association. Some 600 Northern California high school science students attended the Exposition and were taken on guided tours of the Schools of Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy and Nursing.

A sampling of displays and demonstrations for the three-day program included:

- Demonstration of the artificial heart-lung machine.
- An experimental plastic replacement for the aortic valve of the heart, operating in a pump that duplicates the natural pulse.
- · Exhibits showing the effects of pituitary

growth hormone in man, and comparing human growth hormones with those of other species.

- Several examples of use of the electron microscope, which offers magnifications of 100,000 times and more, in studying kidney diseases, eye tissues, and blood vessel functions.
- Investigations of trypanosomiasis (African sleeping sickness).
- Studies of the metabolism of a morphinelike drug, and of the physical characteristics of many drugs and chemicals.
- A study of the effects of dentifrices on bacteria in the mouth.
- A wide variety of instruments for precise measurement and recording in the health sciences. Among these are equipment for tape recording of various physiological functions; for measuring gas content of the blood and for monitoring the electrical activity of the brain and the muscles.

The Exposition was a prelude to Hospital Week, during which time hospitals and medical centers across the country feature recent and current contributions to health care and research.

STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT CLARK KERR, UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

Berkeley, California, September 17

President Clark Kerr of the University of California today urged alumni leaders to support Proposition 4 in the November elections as a measure "that would benefit all higher education of the State."

Proposition 4 would permit eight, rather than four, year terms for the new board of trustees recently appointed to govern the State college system. Kerr said he felt the measure would assure the new board continuity and give the trustees greater independence and autonomy.

President Kerr, speaking before approximately 125 alumni leaders during a Statewide Conference, also discussed the recently adopted Master Plan for Higher Education and the University's anticipated growth.

It is expected, he said, that the University will be able to provide for 119,000 students by 1975. In order to accomplish this, however, The Regents have had to plan for three new general campuses—in Orange County, San Diego, and South Central Coast area. Each will grow to a student enrollment of 27,500.

Kerr also discussed a Growth Study recently adopted by The Regents. This report analyses the educational needs of the State between 1960-1975; and also takes account of long-range needs to the year 2000. At that time it is anticipated the University will have an enrollment of 214,000.

Kerr explained that the Growth Study stresses maintenance of educational quality in the face of rapidly increasing enrollments. The Study also advocates that opportunity for higher education in California will continue to be available to all qualified students.
