Guest speaker at the commencement exercises Saturday, June 12, at 2:30 p.m. at the Civic Auditorium was John H. Knowles, M.D., General Director, Massachusetts General Hospital, Boston, and Professor of Medicine, Harvard Medical School.

Dr. Knowles' topic was "The 1970's — A Watershed Era."

Dr. Philip R. Lee, UCSF Chancellor, welcomed guests, the 638 candidates for degrees and certificates, and the faculty.

Joseph W. McGuire, UC Vice President, represented President Hitch at the ceremonies.

Among the 638 degrees and certificates conferred were: 127 Doctor of Medicine, 76 Doctor of Dental Surgery, 84 Doctor of Pharmacy, 1 Doctor of Nursing Science, 7 Doctor of Philosophy, 135 Master of Science, 6 Master of Arts, 69 Bachelor of Science in Nursing, 51 Bachelor of Science in Dental Sciences, 33 Bachelor of Science in Physical Therapy, 23 Bachelor of Science in Medical Sciences, 3 Certificates in Post Master's Nursing and 23 Bachelor of Science in Dental Hygiene.

Dr. Phillips Thygeson, UCSF professor of ophthalmology emeritus, and director of the Proctor Foundation, emeritus, was awarded an honorary LL. D. degree.

Mary Lasker, co-founder with her late husband of the Lasker Educational and Medical Research Foundation was also awarded an honorary LL. D. degree.

It is a tradition of the Academic Senate at UCSF to select annually a member of the faculty with less than five years of service for "special recognition for distinction in teaching."

The 1971 award was shared by two teachers: Neal Castagnoli, Jr., Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Chemistry and Pharmaceutical Chemistry, and Allan H. Mines, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Physiology in Residence.

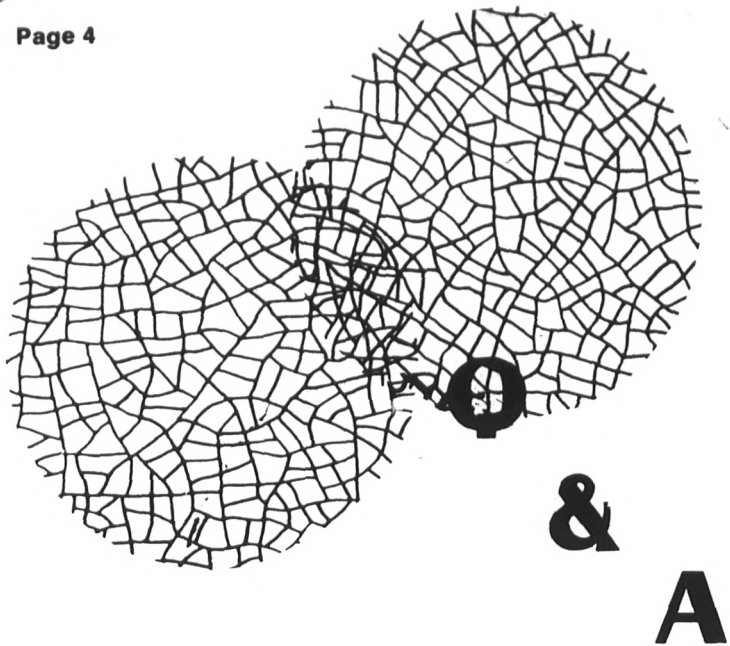

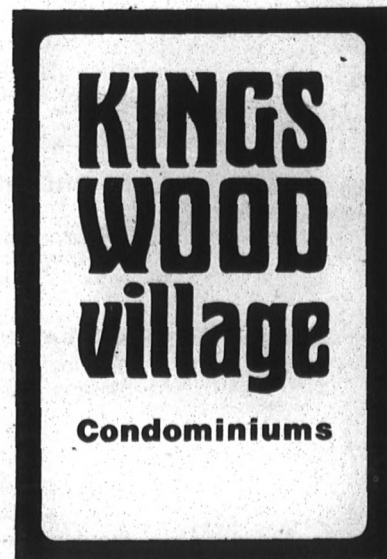
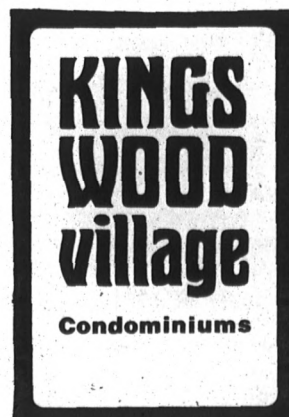
